hether you're Irish or just in the mood for a Gaelic good time, you need to visit Madra Rua. This 4-month-old Rua. This 4-month-old pub in the Old Village in North Charleston is owned by Dublin native Stephen T. O'Connor. Spot lessly clean, the little nook of a

pub oozes that special lure for which the Irish are known. Dark wood booths with padded banquettes and a bar with plenty of Guinness on tap make for a soothing environ that's perfect for a cultural getaway. Irish mu-sic plays at just the right volume and the largely-male, remark-ably attractive staff kept me

very comfortable.

My excellent waiter was a young man with the most endearing Dublin accent and plenty of ing Dublin accent and plenty of self-effacing charm. Food here is sturdy, upscale bar food that's predominantly Irish, but include mainstays such some American as (Angus beef) burgers (\$6.50) and chicken wings (\$4.95.) The day I visited, a series of

substantial-sounding sandwiches were offered as specials, but I couldn't resist the promise of a crispy basket of fish 'n' chips.
Served with a bottle of malt vine gar, the "chips" were hand-cut, skinen fabulars homeomed in skin-on, fabulous homemade in-dulgences. The cod was a tower-ing chunk of moist flesh coated fabulous homemade in with a dense, crispy batter that was just as good as what you might find in the old country. A visit here is almost as much fun as being "over there." So
